Martin Tadlock is Interim President of Northeastern State University, where he has been serving as Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs for the past two years. Before coming to Northeastern State, he served as Assistant Vice-Chancellor for Lifelong Learning and Community Engagement at the University of Wisconsin - Oshkosh, responsible for off-campus degree programs and services to working adults throughout eastern Wisconsin, including online degree programs offered worldwide.

Prior to UW Oshkosh, Tadlock was Dean of Graduate and Professional Studies at California State University - Monterey Bay, Dean of the College of Professional Studies and Graduate Studies at Bemidji State University in Minnesota, Associate Dean and professor of Education at Utah State University, and a faculty member and Director of the nationally recognized Center of Education for the Young Adolescent at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville. Martin began his educational career teaching grades 7-9 for seven years and serving as an assistant principal in a 7-12 school. He was awarded a Ph.D. in Educational Administration and Leadership from Miami University of Ohio in 1990.

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
